
#### **Calmar Secondary School**



## UNDERSTANDING THE SMART PHONE GENERATION

Trustees Klaassen, O'Gorman and Ofstie attended a lecture on 'Understanding the Smart Phone Generation'. The lecture was very informative, and highlighted how smart phones are impacting our younger students, and our lives. There was also information on the correlation of mental effects on students in leisure time, and the awareness of

digital literacy and how to provide information to students.
